9. Does walking the stairs lead to better health?

Of interest, when Larry Robinson first met Charles Godfrey (at age 95 – Charles, not Larry), Larry asked him how he stays in such good shape through his advanced years. He indicated that the primary approach was to take the stairs instead of the elevators. Of interest, a recent study came out demonstrating that climbing the stairs clearly reduces cardiovascular risk. The effect can be seen in as short as 4-8 weeks. This provides background on preventing yourself becoming a VOMIT (Victim Of Medical Imaging Technology). I believe this might also facilitate discussion we have with patients about interpretation of their imaging findings.
